ST MARTIN, BISHOP OF TOURS

This week on 11th November, we celebrate The Feast of St. Martin; Martin was born around 316 AD in Pannonia (modern day Hungary). His father was a soldier in the Roman Army, who enlisted Martin in the army at the age of fifteen. The story goes that, one winter day he saw an ill-clad beggar. Martin had no money to give, but he cut his cloak in half and gave half to the beggar. In a dream that night, Martin saw Christ wearing the half-cloak "*whatever you do unto the least of these you do unto me*" (Matthew 25:40). The Feast of Martin, a soldier who fought bravely and faithfully in the service of an earthly sovereign and then enlisted in the service of Christ, is also the day of the Armistice, which marked the end of the World War I. On 11th November we remember those who have risked or lost their lives in the pursuit of justice and peace. Martin died a Bishop in the Church, in 397 AD.

God all powerful, who called Martin from the armies of this world to be a faithful soldier of Christ: give us grace to follow him in his love and compassion for the needy, and enable your Church to claim for all people their inheritance as children of God; through Jesus Christ, your son, our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.
